Section 4: Program overview

Brief Summary

Men's Club Shabbat at Congregation Beth Shalom has been a Friday night event since its inception decades ago. Both attendance and participation had declined in past years to a point at which about 25 members participated and the audience was less than 100. In 2015, we reinvented the experience for Saturday morning and were able to involve 60 members in the service that was shared with over 350 attendees.

Men's Club Shabbat on Friday evenings was a tradition. The service had a creative theme and members would do thematic readings between the requisite prayers. Our Men's Club Choir would do a number of songs in support of that theme and it was a very stylized experience. The less formal nature of Friday night allowed for taking some license and it was a fun service for many years when Friday night was a significant event. However, lifestyles changed, the Conservative movement placed greater emphasis on Saturday mornings and it became increasingly difficult to



come up with new themes and the general support amongst the Club members waned, despite the fact that we always presented our Kavod Award honoree during the service. (The Kavod Award is our highest honor and it goes to a man who has demonstrated extraordinary service to Men's Club, Congregation Beth Shalom and our community at large. This year we presented our 42nd award.)

At the same time many of our longtime members and Past Presidents were resistant to change. We did some research and found that we were one of the few clubs still on Friday nights. We also had multiple discussions with our Board and our Past Presidents and clergy. The overwhelming feedback we received from our younger members was that they simply were unavailable on Friday nights, but they could and would participate on Saturday and they would include their families.

Against this backdrop we decided it was in the best interests of the club to move to Saturday.

We established the following objectives:

- Men's Club had to "own" the event. This means that we would not merely participate in a few parts of the service, but rather we would run virtually the entire service, with the specific exceptions of Mi Shaberach and Kaddish which had to be done by clergy.
- We wanted maximum participation across all generations. This meant engaging and involving many members.
- We wanted to appropriately honor and recognize past Kavod honorees and Past Presidents.
- Establish a true presence in the ritual aspect of the congregation. We have a strong presence in community activities, social action and social events, but we also wanted to demonstrate the ability of many Men's Club members ritual acumen.
- We wanted to challenge our members to expand upon their ritual experience by learning and leading elements of the service they had never previously done.
- We wanted Men's Club Choir to enhanced the experience with beautiful renditions of prayers and special arrangements

We achieved all of these objectives:

- Sixty Men's Club members participated in the service. As it happened, our March 21 date coincided with Vayikra and Rosh Chodesh. This means that we had three Torahs being used. The service also included Hallel and numerous other special prayers.
- We also used the Harvey R. Gold Sefer Haftarah, which was initiated and dedicated by our Men's Club through the FJMC program.
- Attendance was over 350 people who enthusiastically participated
- Examples of particularly meaningful assignments:
 - Men's Club Prayer read by our first Kavod honoree, who received it 41 years ago.
 - Prayer for armed forces of Israel by head of synagogue Israel Committee whose son is a former IDF Special Forces soldier
 - 12 Past Presidents carried Torahs or had aliyot
 - 14 Kavod honorees had parts
 - 2 men read Torah for the first time

This Week's Torah Reading

Leviticus 3:1- 4:26 page 592; Numbers 28:9-15 page 930; Maftir: Exodus 12:1-20 page 380

As the Book of Leviticus begins, the Israelites are slowly traveling through the desert toward the Promised Land. From the time that they received the Torah at Mt. Sinai, the Israelites offered sacrifices as a way of worshipping God. Vayikra describes these various sacrifices:

- The Olah (burnt offering) signaled that one was in need of communicating with God. The sacrifice could be a sheep, a goat, a bull, a pigeon or a turtledove.
- The Mincha (meal offering) consisted of unleavened flour or grain of the finest quality mixed with olive oil and frankincense. It served the same purpose as the *Olah*, but was brought by one who could not afford to bring an animal offering.
- The Zevach-Shelamim (sacrifice of well-being) was a sacrifice from the herd or one's flock.
- The Chatat (sin offering) and the Asham (guilt offering) expiatory sacrifices intended to secure atonement and forgiveness from God. The Chatat was in some cases a young bull, and in others a sheep or goat. It had to be brought when a person had mistakenly committed a sin. If a person's transgression involved the misappropriation of property intended for the Sanctuary, then an Asham was required.

Insights and Ideas from this week's Torah Reading

Leviticus 5:1 describes the obligation we have to give testimony. "If anyone sins, if he hears a curse, he becomes a witness, if he has seen or known, if he does not testify, then he must bear his guilt." A person who could give testimony and help the court make a decision, but fails to do so, has committed a sin.

This Week's Haftarah Reading

Shabbat HaChodesh Ezekiel 45:16 - 46:18 page 1290

The Haftarah from the Book of Ezekiel reviews the Passover sacrifices as the Prophet describes the restored temple in Jerusalem. The Haftarah describes the festival of Passover envisioned for the new Temple period, stressing the purification at that time. These readings are intended to set our mood and thoughts on the coming Festival of Passover. As our preparations for Passover intensify, both the Maftir reading and the Haftarah focus on rituals connected with the festival. The Maftir and Haftarah each reflect two historical poles in Jewish History: the Maftir, describing the first Passover, and the Haftarah a vision of the Passover of the future, when Israel is restored to its homeland.
